Carbon emissions	Mid Suffolk District Council (MSDC) has published its Greenhouse Gas Emissions report for
reductions	2022/23, which shows a reduction in emissions against 2018/19 (when the Council
	declared a climate emergency and committed to be carbon neutral by 2030.) The leisure
	centres are the biggest cause of emissions. As the first reductions made are the 'low-
	hanging fruit', there will be a lot more work to do to continue this downward trend.
Fees & charges for	For the annual review of fees or charges, MSDC has to consider factors such as inflation
2024/25	and the hours involved. The Council cannot charge for some statutory services and
	national Government sets others. Discretionary charges - such as vehicle licensing and
	litter bin emptying can be set locally - and for these MSDC aims to cover costs.
Flood recovery grants	Further storms have brought yet more flooding, during the wettest winter in c130 years.
	Mid Suffolk District Council has been allocating the government's £500 one-off grants to
	homes that flooded during Storm Babet. Suffolk County Council is now working on
	allocating the grant of up to £5,000 to help households build in greater flood resilience. For
