We did it! We made it to the top of Mount Kilimanjaro!

We would like to start off by saying a huge thank you to all of the support from our wonderful Occold community leading up to our trip. The support at all of our events and the words of encouragement really were wonderful.

On the 5th of October, the three of us (Nicky, Amanda and Zoe) set off on the trip of a lifetime. Reality hit when we saw the mountain from the plane window, and we were flying lower than the summit! We arrived in Tanzania to meet with the rest of our group. There were 33 climbers in all.



We took the lemosho route, which took us about 5 days from start to summit. Then a rapid 1.5 days to descend! The reason for the long ascent is to help acclimatise to the high altitude. The mountain started as jungle type terrain and very hot and humid. After the first day and a half we reached a landmark called lava tower, and it was exactly that! The landscape became dry and dusty and evidence that we were climbing a (sleeping) volcano was all around, with volcanic glass and obsidian rock to be



found. We moved on to a landmark day of climbing the Baranco wall, a scramble up some big rocks to reach stunning views above the clouds. The temperature was dropping by this point.

Summit night began at 11pm and we climbed through the night to reach the highest point at 8.30 am! It was very exhausting, but truly amazing too to see the sun rise from a truly unique view. The temperature was around -15c at the top. The whole team made it together, something we are told is unusual.

We had a fantastic team of guides and porters, who set up our camps, kept us

well fed and watered and ensured our safety all the way. We were truly spoiled with a cup of



tea to wake up with everyday, and even a ginger tea at the summit! The local team who were with us really are the unsung heroes. The atmosphere in camp was fabulous with lots of singing and dancing. We were well versed in some Swahili songs by the time we left.

Kilimanjaro is 5895 meters high and at the top oxygen levels are at around 40%less than in occold! The altitude had varying effects on people, and we experienced a






range of things from complete loss of appetite, dizziness, headaches, nosebleeds, wheezing and upset tummies! Most things quickly resolved when leaving altitude conditions.

I think all three of us still can't quite believe we did it, and are very grateful for all of the sponsorship we received. We raised almost £7000 for our charities, which is incredible! If you see us, we'd love to talk to you about our experience and share all of our stories.

Lucy's news - update from Mid Suffolk District Council

The recent flooding from the Storm Babet and Storm Ciaran has caused devastating damage for many people around the District – including here in Occold. Recovery is going to take some time. Mid Suffolk Council officers have been busy collecting flood damaged items and organising emergency housing for those who need it.

If you experienced flooding at your home or business, you may be eligible for government grants to help with flood recovery and protection.

The government has announced:

- A grant (£500 for homes and £2,500 per business) to assist with initial recovery costs.
- Households and businesses that suffered internal flooding between 19-25 October due to Storm Babet may be eligible for 100% discount to Council Tax / business rates for a minimum of 3 months.
- Flooded property owners may also be able to apply for up to £5,000 to help make their homes and businesses more resilient to future flooding. (Suffolk County Council is working to set this scheme up at the earliest opportunity, but it is not currently available.)

Suffolk County Council is working with the District Councils to get these grants up and running. For more details including how to apply, please see: https://www.midsuffolk.gov.uk/w/storm-babet-information

Please do log details of flooding in your home or business with Suffolk County Council, if you haven't already.

Reporting your flood damage is the first step to receiving a potential grant. If you have experienced flooding to your property as a result of Storm Babet, you need to:

- 1. Visit: https://highwaysreporting.suffolk.gov.uk
- 2. Click on: 'Report It'
- 3. Then click: 'Drainage and Flooding'
- 4. Then click: 'Flooding inside residential / non-residential property'
- 5. Please include as much information as you have, there is also an option to upload photos.
- 6. Once your report has been submitted, Suffolk County Council officers will contact you to gather further information and prioritise those locations that meet the criteria for an official investigation.
- 7. Someone from the District or Borough Council will then contact you to arrange payment, if eligible.

For those who aren't able to submit their report online, please call 0345 606 6171.

Reducing flood risk in the village: With a changing climate, we know that unfortunately we'll face more extreme weather in the coming years. So, what can we do to reduce the risk of homes being flooded again? Some village groups and residents are interested in forming flood 'working group' to work on reducing future flood problems. News from St Michael and All Angels

It is always a pleasure to start these reports with good news, so I'd like to look back to a couple of recent events. Firstly thank you to those hardy volunteers who came to fill yet another trailer with cuttings from the churchyard extension, and cleared back the scrub in the ditch. We are continuing our policy, guided by Suffolk Wildlife Trust, of maintaining the churchyard and extension to benefit the wide variety of wild flowers and plants that grow in these areas, but will also be trying to keep the grass cut back a little more next year to make it easier for families to access graves. Maintenance of graves themselves is a matter for families as the churchyard is not a council cemetery and all costs fall on the congregation of our church or have to be met from fund raising or grants.

It was also good to see so many people attend the brief Act of Remembrance on 12 November, and thank you to all the village organisations and representatives who provided wreaths. We are sorry that the war memorial itself is again discoloured. If anyone is skilled at

cleaning such a monument (we are reluctant to use chemicals or pressure washers as we do not want to cause damage) please do let either of the churchwardens know!

Looking forward, the annual Carol Service will take place from 6:30 pm on Sunday 24th December and we will as usual provide mince pies and mulled wine (or soft drinks) afterwards. As an added incentive, we have reduced the number of carols to a mere seven this year! We will also hold a service in the morning on Christmas Day. As I write this article the time has yet to be confirmed but please look out on the Church notice board for details.

Otherwise the service pattern continues to be a service on the second and fourth Sundays of each month at 9:15 am.

And now to gaze into 2024.... We aim to repeat the book sale in Spring so if you do have books that you would like to donate please do drop them off in the church or at The Beeches (pink house, presently undergoing extensive repairs [!], by the bus stop). For many of us, the Christmas and New Year period is a time to reflect and to think about making healthier and happier choices about our own lives and the lives of our families and friends. I am pleased that the Government will help us to do this by introducing new laws to improve the health of our children and grandchildren and create Britain's first smoke free generation.

As a practising NHS hospital doctor and as an MP, I believe it is the duty of every Government to improve the health of the nation. When I was Minister for Child Health, I was proud to have helped to introduce new laws to ban smoking in cars with children to protect them from the health-related dangers of passive smoking.

Smoking kills. Plain and simple. It is the leading cause of many types of cancer and acquired lung diseases. All too often, as a doctor, I have seen first-hand the reduction in healthy life years caused by smoking. We know that children are four times as likely to start smoking if they grow up with smokers, and once they do it is highly addictive and difficult to quit.

Smoking has become responsible for many thousands of deaths from cancer every year, placing huge pressure on the NHS. Sadly, too many GP appointments each month are taken up by smoking-related illness.

Smoking is also the main driver of health inequality across the country. Deaths from smoking are more than two times higher in the most deprived parts of Suffolk, where more people smoke, compared to our wealthier areas. In simple terms, smoking destroys lives. Therefore, I am pleased that we shall soon see historic new laws which will prevent children who are under the age of 14 this year, from ever legally being sold cigarettes when they turn 18.


The smoking age will be shortly be raised by a year, each and every year, until it applies to the whole population. This has the potential to phase out smoking in the next generation of young adults, almost completely, as early as 2040.


By 2075, up to 1.7 million fewer people in our country will be smoking. The health and care system will save billions of pounds and vast numbers of strokes, heart disease, lung cancer and other lung diseases will be avoided, hundreds of thousands of lives will be saved.

No parent ever wants their child to start the deadly habit of smoking. Becoming addicted to cigarettes in early life is one of the worst things that can happen for future health. Now parents will get the support and backing they need to ensure a healthier and smoke free

future for their children. We can all help build a better and brighter future for our children and grandchildren by stamping out smoking for good. These changes will mean they will never be able to buy a cigarette, preventing them getting hooked and protecting their health.

At a time when we consider our own New Year's Resolutions, I am proud that we are taking the necessary and robust action in the battle to stop England smoking. This game changing plan will make for a healthier country and allow our children and grandchildren to have a much better chance of leading long and healthy lives.

We have had a very interesting couple of months in Book Club. As well as reading our monthly book in September Jo and Jenni promoted the book club on Park Radio. Jo talked







What do all the following have in common: Mary, Joseph and the Shepherds? An answer on a postcard is not required!

Cracker Crust Quiche

Ingredients:

Use up your leftover cheese biscuits to make crust for this quiche
200g mixed crackers for cheese
75g unsalted butter melted
4 eggs plus 1 egg white
100g smoked streaky bacon, roughly chopped
175ml double cream
175ml semi-skimmed milk
75g cheese, grated or crumbled (Cheddar, Brie and Parmesan)

Method:

Preheat oven to 200C

Place crackers in food processor and make into fine crumbs.

Add butter and 1 egg, then whizz to combine.

Place in a 23cm-diameter tart tin and press into the base and the sides of the tin with the back of a spoon. Line with grease proof paper fill with baking beans and bake for 15 mins.

Remove from oven take out greaseproof paper and baking beans.

Brush all over with egg white, bake for another 5mins. Set aside.

Reduce oven to 170 C Fan, 150 C, Gas 3.

Fry bacon until crisp. Place on kitchen paper.

Whisk remaining egg, cream and milk together.

Add the cheese, season, then pour into tin sprinkle with bacon.

Bake for 40mins until just set.

Leave to cool.

Serve with salad and maybe a glass of something!!.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

In October Mid Suffolk District Council formally designated the Parish of Occold as a Neighbourhood Plan Area. Subsequently, the Parish Council has received a grant from the Neighbourhood Planning Programme funded by Department for Levelling Up Housing and Communities.

The grant will cover the cost of the Parish Council's expert consultant, Ian Poole from Places4People, to help prepare the plan itself as well as the cost of Technical Support to compile a Landscape Appraisal Report.

More recently, a survey has been drafted which will go to every household in the village. The survey will capture residents' and community stakeholders' views about what's important to them.

The survey will be launched at a drop-in event, hopefully before Christmas, which will also give the opportunity to learn more about the Neighbourhood Plan process, share views in person and meet those involved. The Victorian instrument has over 100-stops and close to 6,000 pipes that have all been finely re- tuned to the credit of all those skilled people involved. An inaugural concert is soon to take place with internationally renowned concert organist Thomas Trotter.

The Anglican Cathedral itself was founded by the Norman Bishop Herbert de Losinga in 1096 and completed in 1145.





The building has survived a history of battering over the years including riots in 1272 and then re-consecrated in the presence of King Edward 1st in 1278. The current spire has been in place since 1480 and is the second tallest in England behind Salisbury.

The building became a target again in 1643 during the Civil War and restored in 1660.

More recently in 2010 a new hostury was opened by our late Queen Elizabeth 11 and Prince Phillip, Duke of Edinburgh. It has become the main entrance to the cathedral and space has been provided within it for temporary exhibitions.

IN THE GARDEN WITH CAROLINE

Gardening tips for Early Winter 2023

Caroline Miller

In exposed areas prune back roses by approx. 1/3rd to prevent wind rock during bad weather. Finish planting new roses, if the ground is waterlogged or frozen heel-in plants in sheltered areas until conditions improve.

Plant any new trees, fruit bushes, shrubs and hedging. Smaller trees establish themselves more readily than large ones, they often die from being planted too deeply, make sure you plant to the same level as previously grown. Always insert a stake first so as not to damage the roots. Place rabbit or deer guards around if deemed necessary, water well but don't waterlog, mulch well.

Remove any mummified fruits from trees to prevent spread of diseases, prune out dead wood crossings of inward growing branches from apple and pear trees. Red and white currants and gooseberry bushes can be pruned from now until early Spring. DO NOT prune plums or cherries until late Spring/early Summer to reduce risk of disease and die-back.

Shallots and garlic may be planted any time now. Traditionally shallots were planted on the shortest day of the year. If you're thinking of growing carrots next year remember to leave a strip of the vegetable garden un-manured as the carrots will tend to have forked roots otherwise.

Sow sweet peas in pots and protect under glass. When tidying up your herbaceous borders leave a few tall stems and seed heads for the insects and birds. These will also look very decorative with a hoar frost or snow on them.

Remember to check very carefully around the base of any lilies as bright red lily beetles may be hiding there.

Move any permanently planted pots and containers closer to the house walls for shelter, wrap any tender plants in bubble wrap, raise pots off the ground to aid drainage. Remember to keep an eye on them as they will still need the occasional watering even in winter.

If having a bonfire to dispose of your garden waste please check there are no hedgehogs hibernating beneath them as they really won't appreciate being roasted alive!

Delay bringing your Christmas tree indoors as long as possible. Position it away from heat, no matter if it is cut, pot-grown or bare-rooted it will still need watering regularly or you'll soon have a floor covered in needles.

Please keep your bird feeders clean and well stocked, water containers too.
